Our Lourdes experience

We looked after two pilgrims, Shelia and Margaret, who were both incredibly friendly and we enjoyed our conversations with them. Being able to walk down to Mass with them, pushing their wheelchairs and to hear their past experiences of Lourdes was really special. We took them out shopping and they bought us ice cream.

Lourdes was a time to reflect and grow stronger in our faith. This

pilgrimage has changed our lives and how we think on a day-to-day basis. It's made us think a lot more about our own feelings and how we should be treated but also how we should treat others. It was a great time to reflect on the past and we were able to confess at confession. We prayed a lot, and our thoughts and prayers were with our loved ones.

We felt a lot of compassion for the sick and we also felt grateful to be healthy. The school vigil was where we had the most time to reflect and listen to God with our hearts. As a group, we lit candles to leave our prayer intentions and be a symbol of the light of the Eucharist in our lives. We also prayed for our loved ones and our chosen prayer partners.

The International Mass was a time to come together as a community and faith to experience different aspects of our religion from other countries. The Mass being broadcast gives us the opportunity to look back at our experience. The grotto was a place where St Bernadette saw the apparition of Mary. It was special to be able to go round and touch where it happened. Some people in our group volunteered to hold banners which represented our school and diocese. We also made loads of friends from other schools, and it made the experience more social and created a better sense of community and belonging. At dinner time we all ate together, and it brought us all closer. We might have had our ups and downs, but it was part of the experience and by the end of the pilgrimage we didn't want to leave. We had a few hours during the day to do what we wanted. We went shopping and sat at a few cafes talking about what we did or what we were doing that day.
